# Climate Change And Biodiversity

Following the setting up of a Climate Change Monitoring Board, Bracknell Forest Natural History Society now has representation on a joint Climate and Biodiversity Working Group. This has yet to have a formal name.

The object of the Working Group is to look at how we can measure, monitor and prevent further action to accelerate climate change within Bracknell Forest. Objectives for the Group so far are:

- Raise awareness of the group at events and on website
- Encourage small groups to start looking at recording species
- Listen and take feedback
- Work under community organised principles
- Establish subgroups
- Increase geographical representation from the South of the Borough



A series of events where volunteers are welcome to participate will be starting shortly.

We have many areas of concern and appreciate that our goals must cover all of them if possible, including gardens, urban biodiversity, engagement with nature, water pollution, fragmentation of habitats, invasive species, water resources including droughts, climate change of habitats.

We need to have a series of goals with key issues:

- 1. Gardens, especially the overuse of artificial turf, pesticides (e.g. flea treatments for pets and rat poisons).
- 2. Urban Biodiversity, including climate adaptations of habitats, water pollution, extreme weather, invasive species, flood mitigations, carbon sequestration in habitats.
- 3. Fragmentation infuenced by the number of new developments.
- 4. Survey areas for species identification to measure the current position.
- 5. Hold a community event, to publicise and educate the public on the importance of the effects of climate change.
- 6. Continue 'No mow May' as an incentive to improve habitats for insects and birds.
- 7. Provide advice and guidelines to businesses regarding reducing their carbon footprint.

It is important that many of these activities begin with looking at what we already have and how it has been affected by recent changes to climate and environment.

Throughout this year, we can monitor current species at South Hill Park and compare the results to recordings from anything up to 50 years ago.

Our knowledgeable and steadfast team was beaten into third place by Binfield Environment Group recently, at **Wildlife in Ascot's Annual Quiz Night**. ### Nightingale Triangle – Brambles and Bluebells!



In the woodland, January and February have seen the Snowdrop patches appear through the leaf litter left intact since last Autumn. Some areas which we have cleared of Rhododendron Ponticum and brambles over the past few years have started to be invaded by the next generation of woodland 'pests', mostly regrowth. With Winter being a good time to get stuck into serious clearing, our volunteers have 'bramble bashed' for several months, clearing areas large enough to allow for more Bluebell planting.

Each year the patches expand through natural reproduction and by planting ever more bulbs. We are now intending to replant some of the understorey on an ongoing basis, adding carefully selected shrubs and small trees - some sourced locally and others specifically purchased.

Volunteers are always welcome to join us. **We meet at 10.00 am on the first Saturday of each month**. If you'd like to come along and help, please wear suitable heavy duty 'gardening' clothing and covered footwear. Our regular posse of volunteers remains at an average of around fifteen people of varying ages – and as well as lots of fulfilling work of all kinds (including litter picking and path tidying), there is always a warm welcome and plenty of camaraderie.

### Introducing 'Wild Bracknell'



We're all agreed, aren't we, that together it would be great if we could make our community a better place for both nature and people.

**Wild Bracknell** is a new and slightly different environment group, whose purpose is to enhance nature in Bracknell Forest and create networking opportunities for residents and supporters. Wild Bracknell organises and

takes part in projects and runs events aimed at improving nature and our wellbeing. On a smaller scale they also make suggestions for increasing biodiversity in gardens.

## The Outfall Safari is back!

Would you like to help survey the watercourses across Bracknell Forest to identify and reduce pollution? In 2022 The Zoological Society of London did just this: using volunteers they ran an Outfall Safari along our Northern rivers and streams.



Wild Bracknell is repeating the Outfall Safari this year and is extending it to cover every watercourse in the Borough. This is part of a national initiative organised by the Rivers Trust and the Zoological Society of London. No experience is needed - full training will be given in a two-hour training session. Training will take place during March and the project runs from April to June.

During February, a group of Members were lucky to take part in an exclusive guided walk around the special site of Pagham Harbour on the Sussex coast, led by two very knowledgeable and friendly RSPB volunteers. They helped us spot and identify the birds and also brought along two scopes so we were able to get some excellent close up views.



The weather started out a little grey but the sun soon came out and it turned into a beautiful day of bird watching. A total of 29 species were spotted during our visit, including rare sightings of a female Long Tailed Duck *(picture left)* at the Ferry hide and a pair of Goldeneye Ducks at the harbour entrance.

There must have been hundreds of Brent Geese overwintering after a long journey from Siberia *(picture right)* and their soft murmurings to each other were endearing.

The high tide coming in was pushing groups of birds up into the air to find the remaining grassy tussocks



still above water, giving us a chance to see their colours glinting in the sun as they flew. Other birds seen include Avocet, Curlew, Redshank, Snipe, Pintail, Grey Plover, Shelduck, Lapwing, Little Grebe and a Red Breasted Merganser. Skylarks and Stonechats were in the surrounding fields and Reed Buntings perched on the hedgerow.

After the walk and a cup of tea, some of us drove down the road to Church Norton, where we shared the shingle beach with a group of Turnstone Ducks. A late shower didn't dampen our spirits as a double rainbow appeared over the sea to end a perfect day.

### More Volunteering - Check these out!



#### **River Restoration Project, Warfield**

Work has just started on the restoration of a section of the River Cut at Garth Meadows. Rivers 21 and Green & Active are seeking volunteers to help. The work is taking place over several weekdays during March and will consist of clearing banks of invasive species, removal of debris which clogs the flow and other associated tasks.
