January 20 <sup>th</sup> 2020	<b>The Miracle of Bird Migration Explained!</b> – You'll never look at robins and mallards the same way again Expert ornithologist Mark Pearson explains the mysteries of this fascinating phenomenon, without taking away the magic!
February 9th	<b>Birdwatching Trip to Blashford Lakes</b> – These old gravel pits in Ringwood, Hampshire, are spectacular for the presence of huge flocks of overwintering birds. Join us to spot terns, lapwings, oyster catchers and many more. <b>Free Entry</b> .
February 17 <sup>th</sup>	<b>The Wildlife and Geology of Iceland and Norway</b> – Naturetrek's tour leader and expert naturalist David Phillips will describe the ecology and landscape of these beautiful countries, including the spectacular sights of the Northern Lights.
March 16 <sup>th</sup>	<b>Heathlands Underground</b> – Britain's heathlands are of global significance for biodiversity conservation, and Dr Martin Bidartondo of Imperial College, London will describe how the intimate links between fungi and plants help to shape them.
April 20 <sup>th</sup>	<b>Swift Conservation</b> – Swift specialist and founder of the Maidenhead, Marlow and Cookham Swift Group, Jan Stannard, will talk about how swifts are faring in this area of the country, what is being done to help them, and the very positive progress being made.
May 18 <sup>th</sup>	<b>Gilbert White's Birds: Then and Now</b> – John Eyre, president of the Hampshire Ornithological Society, will focus on the changes that have occurred in Selborne's birds and other wildlife, in the centuries since the publication of Gilbert White's book in 1789.
June 15 <sup>th</sup>	<b>BIRDS OF PREY DISPLAY</b> – Join us in the grounds of South Hill Park for a glorious flying display of hawks, falcons and owls, conducted by Paul Gray of GMG Falconry. Meet at the front of the SHP building (adjacent to the Wilde Theatre entrance)
