Nightingale Triangle - Increasing the Biodiversity in our space

The work on our Nightingale Triangle regeneration project continues - with a dedicated team of volunteers forming a morning Work Party on the first Saturday of most months.



Initially the project was mainly concerned with removing many of the non-native plant species, particularly the rhododendrons that had overgrown much of the woodland, including the paths. Having achieved this, the project has entered another phase... We now intend to increase the biodiversity of the space.

We hope to achieve this by providing habitats and food sources to encourage a wider variety of insects, birds, mammals etc. This is where we would like to enlist your help...

Do you have knowledge of what native species we could introduce that might thrive in the rather sandy soil of Nightingale Triangle?

Much of the area is in shade from the trees

overhead. What plants would be most beneficial for attracting insects etc. which live **both below and above ground (beetles, nematodes, moths, butterflies, etc.)?** I am sure there are lots of keen gardeners out there with knowledge of what grows well in sandy/shady places?

Or maybe you are a botanist or entomologist who knows what flora might encourage a healthy and diverse range of fauna. What would be the best way of sourcing plants - grow from seed? cuttings? purchase from specialist nurseries? Is there something we should be doing to make the space more hospitable to a diverse range of flora?

If we get it right with the smaller things, then we feel that the larger more visible species (e.g. hedgehogs, bats etc.) will follow. Maybe your knowledge is limited in this area (mine certainly is!). If so, can you link us up to a contact you have, who might have the necessary expertise?

We will shortly be producing a plan of how we will manage Nightingale Triangle going forward, with an emphasis on maintaining or increasing the biodiversity. If you could contribute to this in any way please let us know your ideas. 
Gillian's memorial trees

PUBLIC RIGHTS OF WAY Inspector Volunteers

We're printing the whole of this recent message from Bracknell Forest Council, which is seeking volunteers for inspecting sections of the Public Rights of Way within the Borough.

In Bracknell we have over 50 miles of public Rights Of Way (ROW) of various classifications including footpaths, bridleways, restricted byways and byways. The local authority has a statutory requirement to maintain the surface of each of these ROWs to their expected standard and, where possible, providing year round access. ROWs may also suffer from access issues such as a more natural, and therefore less manageable, surface; overgrown vegetation; broken or not suitable furniture (gates and stiles); or blockages such as fallen trees or fly tipping etc. Unfortunately it is impossible for council officers to regularly inspect all the paths by themselves and therefore a team of volunteers is required. Can you help?

Volunteers are asked to individually inspect a selection of paths twice a year (in summer and winter), and, where possible, the inspected paths are linked to allow for a hopefully enjoyable walk. They can either be completed as one walk or split into individual paths, whichever suits. Inspectors are asked to complete a report form, which will be provided, and comment on any findings, allowing the council to be proactive when managing the ROW network.



No practical work is expected and only completed if desired to do so (often landowners must be consulted beforehand). We currently have paths in Sandhurst, Crowthorne, Bracknell and Binfield. The Big Meadow Search

Have you heard about The Big Meadow Search, another Citizen Science project being run this Summer? If not, here are the details, and it's easy to take part!



The **Big Meadow Search (BMS)** is a Citizen Science project which aims to encourage people to record plants in an area of grassland of their own choice. The idea is to get them outside, to look at what they're walking through, and to learn to identify the plants they find, thus raising awareness and interest in grasslands and their importance. It began in 2021 as an initiative by the Carmarthenshire Meadows Group in West Wales, and was at first only intended to be carried out

there, but it generated interest well beyond Wales, so it has been expanded to cover the whole of the UK.

The BMS species check list is based on the National Plant Monitoring Scheme grassland indicator species, plus additional species of interest from meadows and grasslands – but all plants found should be recorded, whether they are on the BMS species list or not. Any type of species-rich grassland can be searched: meadows, churchyards, road verges, amenity grassland etc. Obviously, if it's not public access land, make sure you get permission!

To take part:

- Select your grassland
- Record the location name, grid reference and date
- Walk around and write down all the plants you can see

• If you aren't sure on a species, take photographs from multiple angles of the flower heads, basal and stem leaves, upper and lower leaf surface, leaf base shape and either post on the BMS social media or **email the organisers at**

bigmeadowsearch@gmail.com and they will try to identify the species.

 You then enter your results on their website <u>www.bigmeadowsearch.co.uk</u> and once they have finished their BMS analysis, they will send them on to your local environmental record centre (LERC).
